

PRIDE ACKNOWLEDGEMENT SYSTEM

NCG recognises students who do the right thing and demonstrate our PRIDE values.

NCG staff will issue a PRIDE card when they see one of the PRIDE values being displayed.

Collect your PRIDE card from your teacher, fill it in, and deposit it in the appropriate pūtoi box in the library – if they aren't in, you can't win!

Twice a term a random prize draw will take place during a special PRIDE assembly – each card you have been awarded for that term is eligible for the prize draw.

Each term certificates and badges will also be awarded – these are calculated by the number of cards you get for the whole year.

Certificates and badges are issued every year.



SCHOOL-WIDE LEARNING VALUES

Learning to Learn is the explicit teaching of methods that increase student agency in their learning. This means that students then have the tools available to them to make sense of, question and engage with the classroom material they are presented with. Learning to Learn is based on the work of Guy Claxton and Michael Fullan and has informed the NCG Learning Values which are; Resilient, Resourceful, Reflective and Relational.



SCHOOL-WIDE SOCIAL EXPECTATIONS MATRIX

Staff and students have co-created clear expectations across a wide range of settings. We will teach these expectations to the students and acknowledge them frequently with our acknowledgment system – PRIDE Cards. The expectations for all student behaviour will be clear throughout our learning and social areas.



ĀRAHI TIME AT NCG

PURPOSE

To empower and nurture the whole student as a learner.

It is well researched and acknowledged that successful learning outcomes rely upon having a good sense of wellbeing. Ārahi time at NCG is just one way we aim to foster this with our ākonga. Ārahi time occurs three times a week for 30 minutes with a kaiārahi (member of staff) who will remain in this role throughout your child's years at NCG. Each ārahi group will have approximately 17 students (ākonga) from all year groups in order to enhance the Māori concept of tuakana – teina. This is a reciprocal learning partnership between student and kaiārahi, between peers and between home and school.

OUR PHILOSOPHY BEHIND THE MENTORING PROGRAMME IN ĀRAHI TIME IS:

- To build stronger relationships with ākonga and whānau; working in a partnership to improve educational outcomes
- To be future focused and up to date with 21st century learning, to help students to cope with our rapidly changing world
- To help our ākonga help themselves to be better learners and prepare them for a lifetime of learning

CORE VALUES OF OUR MENTORING PROGRAMME ARE:

- Manaakitanga Cherishing and enhancing the mana of others
- Whanaungatanga Acknowledging and building relationships
- Kotahitanga Shared understanding of our vision and a commitment to learning together

There is a termly focus to our ārahi programme, which is based on research and student voice and adapted to meet the ever-changing needs of our ākonga. Content may include; understanding the brain, managing day to day stress, sleep, emotions, identifying strengths, discussing challenges, activities to connect the group and managing self. Ārahi time is often also a perfect forum to support whole school intiatives such as Enviro Week, Maori Language Week, Bully Free NZ Week, Mental Health Awareness Week.

Another popular feature of ārahi time is the regular well-being and learning check-ins that students have with their kaiārahi throughout the year. This empowers our students to direct their own learning through one-to-one mentoring conversations using real time data.

If you would like to know more about ārahi time or would like to contribute to this programme please feel free to contact us. We are continually looking for ways to develop and enhance this time for our ākonga.

UNIFORM

Take care with your appearance; wear your uniform with pride. The following reminders will help you to do this. All items of uniform need to be in good repair. The uniform is regularly reviewed and some regulations may be subject to change.

UPPER GARMENTS

- School navy jersey with crest or school vest with crest
- NCG short-sleeved blouse with crest OR NCG long sleeved blouse with crest
- NCG blazer (not a compulsory item)

LOWER GARMENTS

- EITHER NCG skirt
- OR NCG kilt
- OR NCG trousers with crest
- OR NCG shorts with crest

FOOTWEAR

- Flat navy blue, black or brown sandals worn without socks (no jandals, no adornments).
- Flat completely black shoes (no ankle boots or high tops; no adornments, stripes, logos or white soles)
- Plain black or white ankle socks OR full-length tights.

OPTIONAL ITEMS

- Plain navy blue, plain black or NCG scarf (not worn during class time).
- Plain black or navy blue jacket (not worn during class time).

HAIR AND MAKE UP

- Hair needs to be a natural colour
- No obtrusive ribbons, headbands or hair ties
- Natural looking makeup, if worn
- Clear or light nail polish only

ACCEPTABLE NON-UNIFORM ITEMS

- Earrings –plain, small studs or sleepers
- Jewellery –one taonga/small necklace or bracelet
- Tiny metal/plastic nose stud (ball no bigger than 2mm); this may need to be removed in some classes for health and safety reasons.

- NCG blue sports polo available from the uniform shop
- NCG PE top
- Blue shorts of own choice
- Blue or black trackpants/tights of own choice
- Optional: NCG Swarm T Shirt available from Sports Office if you become a Swarm member in 2024. More information is available from the Sports Office.

SWIMWEAR REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SCHOOL POOL

All students using the school pool are required to wear either:

- Swimming togs
- Swimming tops and short board shorts

This includes all students in Physical Education and Outdoor Education classes and also during recreation time at lunchtime and after school.

Meet your friends and chill out in our beanbags at interval, lunchtime, before or after school. Play cards, try a craft activity or win a prize in one of our competitions.


JOIN OUR STUDENT LIBRARIAN TEAM

ATTENDANCE

Unplanned absence e.g. sick, funeral

If your child is unable to go to school, a parent/caregiver must email absences@ncg.school.nz or phone the school (03 548 3104 - press option 1) giving your child's name, ārahi group and reason for the absence before 9am on the day of the absence, or prior to this day if possible.

Appointments during school hours

If it's not possible to make an appointment outside of school hours, then you need to either email absences, phone or organise your child to bring in a note or appointment card. Students need to come to the Student Office to receive a yellow permission slip and to sign out **before leaving** for their appointment. On return to school, students must sign back in at the Student Office.

Intended absence of 1 day or more

For school trips/events students need to collect an Intended Absence form from the Student Office. The form is used to record assessment negotiations e.g. negotiated due dates for assessments or altered assessment time. For intended absence of 1 day or more (e.g. Holiday, University Open Days, representing sporting fixtures etc.) parents/caregivers need to email the Principal (heather.mcewen@ ncg.school.nz) as soon as possible. Parent/Caregiver will receive a response advising code for absence and the student to collect an Intended Absence form from the Student Office. For Seniors this coding is very important as it can affect a student's right to an extension for an assessment.

SICKNESS OR INJURY AT SCHOOL

If your child feels unwell or has an accident during the day, they must excuse themselves from class and go to the Student Office. The staff will admit your child to the Health Centre for assessment, treatment and/or contact parents/caregivers as necessary.

BEING ON TIME


If your child is late, please ask them to go straight to class. If later than 9.15am, they must sign in at the Student Office. A note from home or phone call is required within three days to explain the late arrival.

CLEARING ABSENCES

Students have three days to clear absences. They must collect a yellow absence check form from their ārahi teacher or the Student Office. Once completed, they need to hand this into the Student Office.

COUNSELLING AND SOCIAL WORK DEPARTMENT (CSW)

LOST PROPERTY

Please name ALL your child's belongings. All items that are named will be returned to the student. All lost property should be reported missing and can be claimed from the Student Office if it has been handed in.

STUDENT LOCKERS

Secure lockers are available for students. These are allocated on a first come first served basis as unfortunately there are not enough lockers for every student. There is an annual charge of \$25.00. Once the student has been allocated a secure locker, this will be their locker for all of their school years or until they choose not to have one.

STATIONERY

METHODS OF PAYMENT (CASH, EFTPOS, ONLINE VIA KAMAR PORTAL)

At NCG we use a school management system (SMS) called Kamar. We use Kamar to manage various student aspects throughout their time at NCG - one of these being the management of student finances.

Access is through the NCG Website. Please select the 'Whānau/Akonga' link using the parental log in details emailed to you at the beginning of the year and follow the prompts.

Once you are logged in it is very simple to use. The system will detail all charges/donations and you can choose to either pay the account in full or select which items you want to pay for at the time. Payment can be made by debit or credit card. This is processed through a secure payment gateway, 'Payment Express'. No numbers are stored or able to be recalled for future use.

E-LEARNING AT NELSON COLLEGE FOR GIRLS

MICROSOFT SCHOOL

The use of technology in and beyond the classroom facilitates an extensive learning process. Here at NCG we are proud to be a certified partner of Microsoft. We will work closely with them to lead innovation in education. Our vision is to give our students the skills they will need for their ongoing success at the completion of their secondary schooling.

BYOD

As you will be aware Nelson College for Girls is a BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) school and many of our learning activities from Year 7 to Year 13 require the use of a device. The specifications we look for in a device for use at school are that it is lightweight, reasonably fast, has good storage, good wifi, is robust and with a keyboard.

To assist parents in purchasing a device, we have teamed up with Noel Leeming to provide access to devices at a favourable price. Visit https://www.noelleeming.co.nz/byod and signup for great prices on BYOD devices.

Students are able to bring devices that they already own. However, a phone is not a satisfactory device for learning. If you need further information or help please contact the IT team at school or pop into any Noel Leeming store.

SUPPORT AVAILABLE

We have a team of highly qualified IT Support Staff that are available to offer assistance everyday during school hours. The technicians are trained in Microsoft, Apple and Adobe products to ensure that our students get the support they need, regardless of the device type or issue.

SOFTWARE AVAILABLE

Our goal is to help prepare our students for "life after school", so all students are provided with access to industry standard software.

All students are provided with an account which will allow them to download the full suite of MS Office product onto 5 computers (including home computers) and the full suite of Adobe Creative Cloud applications. Other subject specific software is available to those students that require it.

ACCESSING THE NCG NETWORK AND WIFI

When students start at Nelson College for Girls, they will be given a username and password. This username and password will give students access to the computers at school and access to the wifi network for their own devices.

DEVICES FOR LEARNING

Students do require a device for learning at school and home. These should be brought to school every day. Some devices are better than others for doing school work. The best device will be a lightweight laptop, particularly one which has a touch screen for handwriting and drawing. A phone is NOT a suitable learning device in school.


The SchoolBridge App gives you access to newsletters, results attendance and notices. We also use this app for our emergency alert notifications.



Office 365 is the online environment for both staff and students. All students have an email account and online versions of Microsoft Office. Students are entitled to download the full office suite to their devices.



Adobe Creative Cloud is a set of applications and services from Adobe Systems that gives students access to a collection of software used for graphic design, video editing, web development, hotography, along with a set of mobile applications. Students are able to download the applications to their devices.



MOBILE PHONE GUIDELINES (under review)

Mobile phones are changing our young people's behaviour in ways that could not have been predicted and schools all over New Zealand are reviewing their procedures around the use of electronic devices during school hours. Technology has a significant role to play in the classroom, but this needs to be facilitated with care to ensure students learn positively. Personal mobile phones, on the other hand, are proving to be an unnecessary distraction for our students in terms of their access to social media sites, as well as potentially being a source of negative social interaction amongst peers.

There are growing and serious concerns around this issue and schools also have a legal duty of care to keep students safe and provide them with a secure physical and emotional environment in which to learn. Not only is distraction and a lack of sleep a big issue relating to mobile phone use, but there is also the threat of online predators and cyber-bullying. For these reasons, Nelson College for Girls has reviewed our position on mobile phones and formulated new guidelines for staff and students:

- If a student brings a phone to school, they must keep it in their bag on silent or in a designated place as directed by their teacher for the duration of the classroom period. Mobile phones are not considered as a BYOD (bring your own device).
- Students may only access their phone when directed to do so by their teacher and it is only to be used for teaching and learning purposes, for example videoing peer to peer dialogue in a language class.
- If a parent/caregiver needs to contact their child URGENTLY during class-time, they should call the Student Office on 03 548 3104 ext 5. Please state if it is urgent and we will make sure the student returns your call from a school phone as soon as possible. Please do not text or ring your child during class time.

10 DAY TIMETABLE

Nelson College for Girls operates a 10 day timetable. This gives us more flexibility in the courses that we can run. It means we can offer a wider variety of courses at junior level and gives seniors more time with their subject teachers.

- Each week is labelled 'A' or 'B'
- Week 1 = A' and Week 2 = B' etc
- Every Monday will not be the same, but every 2nd Monday will be.
- If the term holidays start at the end of Week 'A', it will be Week 'B' after the holidays.

90 MINUTE PERIODS

Longer periods give us more time for quality teaching and learning. Less time is wasted on resource organisation, walking between periods and it creates more opportunity for different learning experiences.

- There will be three 90 minute periods each week Monday, Wednesday and Thursday.
- Every subject in the senior school will have one 90 minute period every 10 days.
- In Year 10 there may be a 90 minute period for each subject.
